They were split into groups of 2 and one person dissected and the other wrote in the packets that were given. Soon the 7th graders will dissect the crawfish/crayfish.

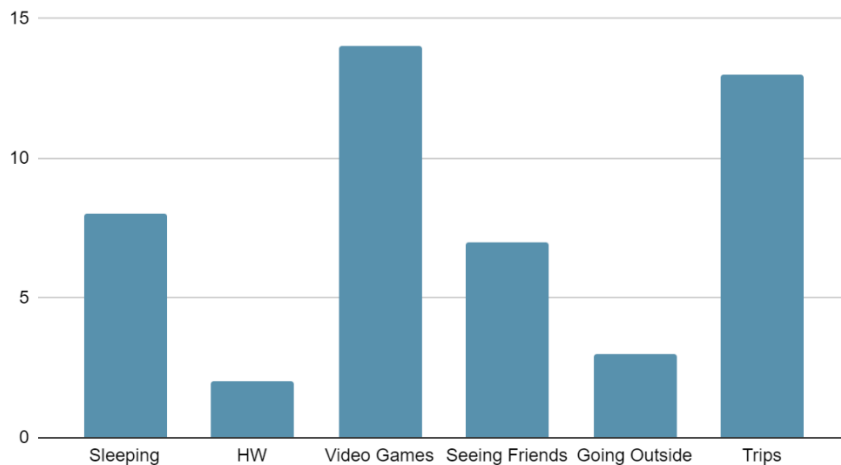

What is your favorite activity over winter break?

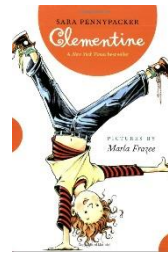
