Choose one of the following for your creative book report.

Story-Based Options

1. Add to the Story

Write a continuation: What happens next? How does the conflict return? How do the characters respond? Unless noted otherwise, your writing should be at least 40 handwritten lines.

2. Plot Twist or Alternate Ending

Change one major decision a character made. How would that change the story? Continue the story in the author's style.

3. Diorama of a Key Scene

Create a 3D scene (using clay, Legos, or other materials).

• Include at least 10 labeled details and write a paragraph explaining the scene's importance.

5. Illustrate the Story

Draw 5 scenes from the book.

• Each drawing should include at least 5 key details and write a short explanation for each scene.

Character-Based Options

6. Character Interview

Write a series of interview questions and answer as if you are the character. Use their style of speaking and personality.

7. Character Diary

Write a diary from the character's point of view. Reflect on the major events of the story through their eyes.

8. Letter to a Character

Write a letter offering advice to a character. What should they have done differently? Include helpful, Bible-based suggestions.

9. Act It Out

Choose a key scene and act it out as one of the characters. Dress up, use body language, and try to sound like the character.
